To Fill Out The Forms

You will need your and your spouse's personal information:

- Full name
- · Birth date and location
- Current address and work information
- Driver's license number & SSN
- Information on income, spending, and assets.

How to File





Preparing to File

Check the court website to find out about parking, payment options, work hours, and any additional requirements that the court may have at the moment. There may be an additional court or county-specific form for you to fill out.

Notarizing Forms

Be careful when signing forms – some can only be signed in front of a notary public. You will likely find one in your local city/town hall, court, or bank.

Make sure that everyone who needs to sign the form (just you or your spouse as well) have a valid photo ID.



Filing for Divorce

Give the initial set of forms to the court clerk and pay the filing fee, which will be about \$300.



Serving Your Spouse

Process of service is mandatory in a divorce. Be careful and follow the due process, as you may not be able to proceed with your divorce otherwise.

A sheriff or a process server can be the one giving the paperwork to your spouse. In certain cases, it can be you as long as you take all the necessary steps.

Finalizing Your Divorce

After the 60-day waiting period is over, you can ask the court to schedule the final hearing for your case.

On the day of the hearing, dress appropriately and be on time. Bring the final set of forms with you and file them with the court.

When in the courtroom, stand when talking to a judge, and refer to them as "your honor." Once the divorce is granted by the judge, be sure to take further steps to officially finalize it.

Note that there are additional steps to the process, which depend on various factors. These steps will be covered in detail in the filing guide you receive along with your forms.
